E ngā mātua, tēnā koutou katoa, talofa Dear Parents/Caregivers,

Monday was a special day for us as we were back in the Church for the first time since March as a whole school. The Year 4-6 syndicate led us in our prayers and reflecting on the Gospel - what a pleasure to be able to worship together again! Other aspects of our curriculum are now back up and running too, such as kapa haka with our tutors from Hakahiva, Project Energise coordinators working with Year 7&8's, and choir and band getting started again.

St John's have been teaching basic first aid to our Year 4-8 classes this week too. It is wonderful to have this variety in our learning programmes again after so long. I also want to thank our community for their support and patience as we navigate through this pandemic. I have been so impressed by the way everyone has been able to roll with the changes and adapt to this ever changing environment.

Thank you for keeping your children home when they are sick. The 'Golden Rules' for Alert Level 1 clearly state "*If you're sick, stay home. Don't go to work or school. Don't socialise."* Covid-19 has certainly taught us all about the importance of hygiene, and there are many good practices that we will continue to encourage at school, such as washing hands regularly, coughing and sneezing into elbows, and limiting handshakes.

With the two new cases of Covid-19 in New Zealand yesterday, this is a timely reminder to continue to follow good hygiene practices and to act with caution for anyone who is showing new onset or worsening symptoms of one or more of the following:

- Cough
- Fever
- Sore throat
- Runny nose
- Shortness of breath/difficulty breathing
- Temporary loss of smell

Anyone with these symptoms should ring Healthline on o8oo 358 5453 or their GP. They will advise on testing for COVID-19.

It has come to our attention that some children have had school sores (impetigo) since we came back to school. Impetigo is a common and contagious skin infection that causes blisters on exposed parts of the body, such as hands, legs and face, and are contagious.

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, Cycle A (John 6:51-58)

This Sunday we celebrate a second solemnity during this period of Ordinary Time in the liturgical calendar. Today is the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. This day was once called Corpus Christi, which is Latin for "Body of Christ." In the revised Lectionary the name for this day is expanded to reflect more completely our Eucharistic theology.

Today's Gospel is taken from the Gospel according to John. The reading is part of a discourse between Jesus and a crowd of Jews. The discourse comes shortly after the miracle of Jesus' multiplication of the loaves and fishes. In John's Gospel, miracles such as this are identified as "signs" through which people come to believe that Jesus is the Son of God. These signs are followed by dialogue, or discourse that interprets and explains the miracle. In John's Gospel, Jesus' multiplication of the loaves is said to have occurred near Passover, thus linking it to the Exodus story and God's saving action toward the Israelites.

Having seen Jesus multiply the loaves and fishes, the crowd pursues him, perhaps seeking more food but also looking for another sign. Jesus tells the crowd that he is the bread of life. He explains that just as God gave the Israelites manna to sustain them in the desert, so now God has sent new manna that will give eternal life. It is in this context that Jesus repeats those words in today's Gospel and tells them again that he is the living bread that came down from heaven.

Jesus' words are not well understood by the crowd; they argue that Jesus is not from heaven but born of Mary and Joseph. The crowd also has trouble understanding how Jesus could give them his flesh to eat. Jesus tells them that when they eat his flesh and drink his blood, they will remain forever connected to him. These are difficult words, but they are important because they seek to show us our intimate connection with Jesus.

This is the mystery that is at the heart of our Eucharistic theology. In the elements of bread and wine, Jesus' Body and Blood are truly present. When we share in the Body and Blood of Christ, Jesus himself comes to dwell within us. This communion with the Lord makes us one body, brings us eternal life, and sends us forth to be Christ's Body in the world.

Kapa haka

Matariki

Matariki Celebrations are visible within the classrooms at St Joseph's. Classes have been looking at a number of Myths and Legends that link to this important celebration. This year Matariki begins on 13th July in 2020. Matariki is the Maori name for a group of seven stars known as the Pleiades star cluster. Matariki appears in the eastern sky sometime around the shortest day of the year, and is thought to determine how successful the harvest crop will be in the coming season. The brighter the stars, the more productive the crop will be.
